More Quilt Show News

The quilt show will be upon us in a month! After all the months of preparation, the last period of time seems to fly by. Be sure to put a label on your quilt with your name, chapter, and quilt name, and put it in a zippered pillowcase with your name, chapter, address and phone number written on it. Bring it to the May meeting to turn in to Brenda DeJarnette.

If you haven't volunteered to help at the quilt show yet, please call Leslie Jo Waters (703 591-5117) or email her (watershj@verizon.net) and do so. This year the committee is offering a \$5 admission in exchange for 4 hours work. If you can't devote that much time, but are still willing to help, Leslie will cheerfully accept fewer hours. You won't get the volunteer admission, but you will get the satisfaction of having helped to put on this excellent show, which can't happen without several hundred of us volunteers.

If you haven't checked out the list of classes, time is getting short to do so. Check on the web (<http://www.quiltersunlimited.org/docs/2007ShowClasses.pdf>), in case

the class you want is sold out or cancelled.

There were a few classes where our lack of quilt entry fees or shopping profits prevented the committee from pricing the classes quite as low as professional shows, and the enrollment wasn't sufficient to bring in enough revenue to afford to pay the teachers. There are also a couple of classes completely filled and only taking waiting list names.

Be sure to check the show program for coupons at some of the vendors' booths. Also, the sponsors page has been posted on the QU website (<http://www.quiltersunlimited.org/showadverts2007.htm>). Thanking those vendors for buying ads to support our program will let them know that we appreciate their support. This page will stay posted until next spring, and the resources listed should prove useful.

We will be hanging over 550 quilted items, garments and dolls. We have a full complement of vendors coming, including a couple dozen new booths. Sewing machine deals with the demo machines abound, and

there will be all sorts of machines you can try out. Contact Connie Dobrenz (R) immediately if you have donations for the silent auction which you haven't turned in, and be sure to check out the great deals there during the show.

Friday's free demonstrations include batik stamping, redwork, punchneedle, marbling fabric, and quilting tools. Saturday demos include antique Japanese fabrics, curved rulers, quilt embellishments, binding techniques, Robbing Peter to Pay Paul, and shortcut piecing techniques. Sunday's demos include a pieced Dresden Plate, ARDCO templates, making and embellishing quilted postcards, and mini bargello techniques with leftover scraps.

Month 1

FABRIC REQUIREMENTS:



FABRIC A: 5 yards (includes outer border and binding)

A multicolored floral or geometric print that should have 3 or 4 different colors. Stay away from directional prints.



FABRIC B: 3 yards

The main color you want to pull out of Fabric A. This should be the strongest color in the quilt and will bring out the design in the quilt. A tone-on-tone or very subtle print will work best.



FABRIC C: 3 yards

This fabric should compliment Fabric A but not compete with it. It should be one of the colors in Fabric A but not the same as Fabric B. This fabric will appear in larger pieces, so think "texture".



FABRIC D: 2 yards

This is the background fabric. It can have texture, but keep the fabric low key.



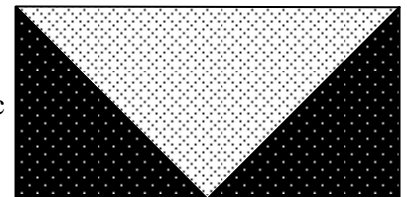
FABRIC E: 2 ½ yards

A third color pulled from Fabric A. It can be a little more intense than Fabric C, but not as intense as Fabric B. This fabric should look pleasing next to Fabric C since they usually appear side by side. Fabrics C and E should have a little bit of contrast so they don't blend in together.

From Fabric B, cut 12 strips 3-3/8" wide. Cut these strips into 128 squares measuring 3-3/8". Cut each square in half diagonally to yield 256 triangles.

From Fabric D, cut 6 strips 6-1/4" wide. Cut these strips into 32 squares measuring 6-1/4". Cut each square in half diagonally twice like an "X" to yield 128 triangles.

Sew a Fabric B triangle to a Fabric D triangle along the bias edge. Press toward Fabric B. Repeat for the other side. You will end up with 128 flying geese measuring 5-1/2" x 3".

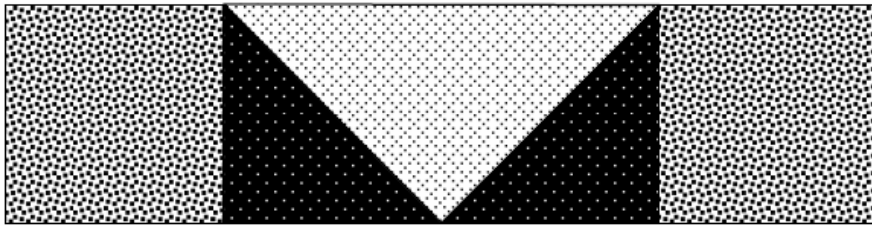




Month 2

From Fabric C, cut 5 strips 5-1/2" wide. Cut these strips into 5-1/2" squares. You will need 31. Set these squares aside for later use.

From Fabric C, cut 10 strips 3" wide. Cut these strips into 3" squares. You will need 128. Sew a 3" square to each side of 64 of the flying geese from Month 1. These units should measure 10-1/2" x 3"



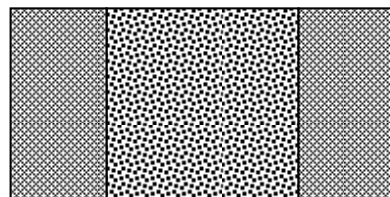
Note from the pattern's author:

Fabric amounts are for the complete top. The 5 yards of Fabric A includes the outside border as well as the binding. Not to give too much of the mystery away, but one of these yards is for the binding. If you have a piece of fabric that you think would be perfect, but it's only 4 yards, go ahead with it. You can then choose to do the binding in one of the other fabrics. I tried to round up slightly on the fabric requirements to account for cutting errors. Not a whole lot, but enough that if you make a bad cut, you don't have to start sweating.

Final size: 90 x 110

Month 3

From Fabric E, cut 9 strips 5-1/2" wide. Cut these strips into 5-1/2" x 3" rectangles. You will need 124 rectangles. Sew a Fabric E rectangle to 2 opposite sides of the 31 Fabric C squares (5-1/2") from Month 2. You will only be using 62 Fabric E rectangles. Save the rest for later. Press seams towards Fabric E. This unit should measure 5-1/2" x 10-1/2".

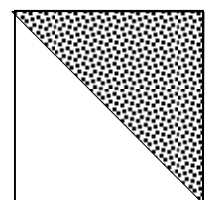


Month 4

If you don't want to piece your outer borders, cut a piece of Fabric A 28" wide by 4-1/2 yards long. From the remaining Fabric A, cut 32 squares measuring 5-1/2".

The left over fabric is for the binding.

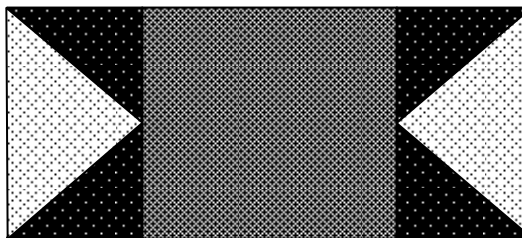
From both Fabrics B and C, cut 6 strips 3-3/8" wide. Layer 1 strip each of Fabrics B and C right sides together and cut into 62 pair of 3-3/8" squares. Cut the squares in half diagonally to yield 124 half-square triangles. Sew these triangle pairs together on the long edge, and press seams toward Fabric B. The squares should measure 3".



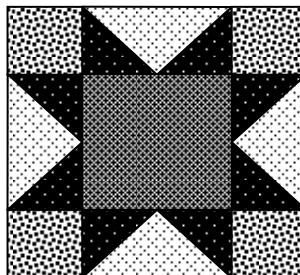


Month 5

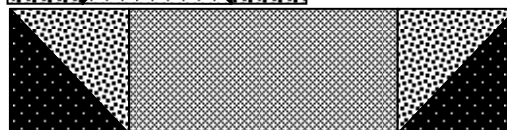
Sew the remaining flying geese from Month 1 to 2 opposite side of Fabric A squares (5-1/2") from Month 4. The point of the goose should touch the Fabric A square. Press toward Fabric A. This unit should measure 5-1/2" x 10-1/2".



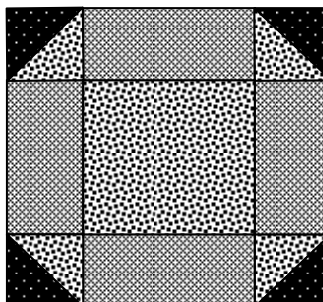
Sew the flying goose/square units from Month 2 to the remaining 2 sides of the above Fabric A/flying goose unit. Press toward Fabric A. You now have 32 blocks measuring 10-1/2". These blocks will now be referred to as "BLOCK A".



Sew the Fabric B/C squares from Month 4 to 2 opposite ends of the remaining Fabric E rectangles from Month 3. Fabric C should touch the Fabric E rectangle. Press toward Fabric E. This unit should measure 3" x 10-1/2".



Sew these units to the remaining sides of the Fabric C/E units from Month 3. Press toward Fabric E. You should now have 31 blocks measuring 10-1/2". These blocks will now be referred to as "BLOCK B".



Month 6

The center of the quilt consists of 9 rows with 7 blocks in each row. Rows 1, 3, 5, 7, and 9 start and end with an "A" block and alternate with a "B" block. Rows 2, 4, 6, and 8 start with a "B" block and alternate with an "A" block. Press all seams toward the "B" blocks.

Each row should measure 10-1/2" x 70-1/2". Sew the rows together. Release 2 or 3 stitches in the seam allowance at the block intersections, and press the seams in a rotating fashion.

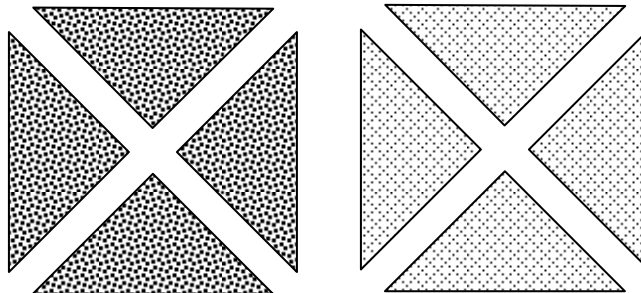
Your quilt center should measure 70-1/2" x 90-1/2". If it is a little off, don't panic. There will be directions in month 8 to help you out.



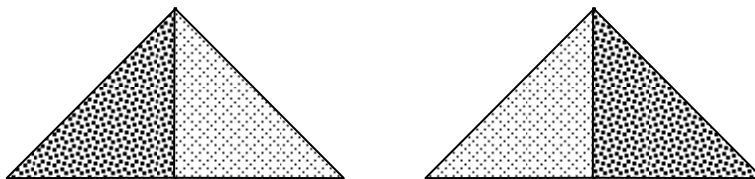
Mystery Quilt: Month 7

Cut 3 strips of both fabrics C and D 3-3/4" wide. Layer the 2 different fabrics right sides together, and cut into 3-3/4" squares. You will need 32 squares.

Cut these squares diagonally twice like an "X" to yield 128 quarter square triangles from each of fabrics C and D.



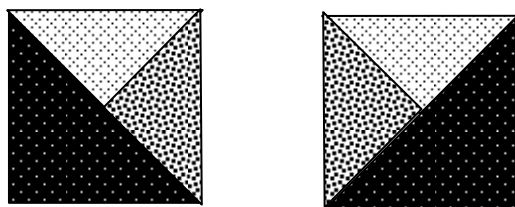
With fabrics C and D still layered right sides together, sew along one short side. Sew half of the pairs with fabric C on the top and half with fabric D on the top. This will result in mirror image triangle sets. You will have 64 of each kind.



Mystery Quilt: Month 8

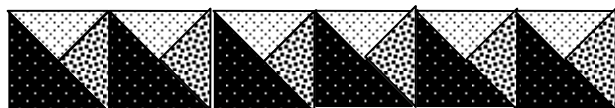
Cut 6 strips of Fabric B 3-3/8" wide. Cut into 68, 3-3/8" squares. Then cut the squares in half diagonally once to yield 136 half-square triangles. Set 8 triangles aside for later.

Sew the remaining 128 triangles onto the Fabric C/D triangle units from Month 7 along the long side. You will end up with 64 each of the following two squares that measure 3".

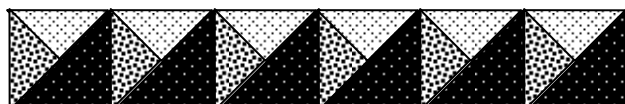


Sew the above pieced squares into two rows of 14 squares per row and two rows of 18 squares per row. These rows will use pieced squares that are all alike. Repeat for the pieced squares going in the opposite direction.

INNER BORDER:

Measure the center part of your quilt. It should measure 70-1/2" x 90-1/2" including seam allowances. If it does not, adjust the width of the inner border. You want the quilt to measure 73" x 93" including seam allowances after the inner border is added. For example, if your quilt measures 71" x 91", you will adjust the width of the inner border and cut it 1-1/4" wide. If your quilt measures 70" x 90", you will adjust the width of the inner border and cut it 2"

To make the inner border, cut 9 strips of Fabric E 1-3/4" wide x width of fabric. Sew 5 strips together with a 45-degree seam.

Measure quilt top to bottom and cut 2 strips this length from the long strip of Fabric E. Sew these to the sides of the quilt, and press toward Fabric E.

Sew the remaining 4 Fabric E strips into 2 pair. Measure quilt side to side, and cut the strips to this length. Sew to top and bottom of quilt, and press toward Fabric E. Your quilt should now measure 73" x 93".



Mystery Quilt 2006—2007

I hope you have enjoyed this year's mystery quilt. Susan L. Vukson, the author of our Mystery Quilt, gave us permission to use her copyrighted pattern. She developed this quilt for the North Pittsburgh Quilters Guild. She is very interested in our response to her pattern, so I will be taking pictures at the June meeting to send to her. There will be a drawing for prizes, so don't forget to bring your finished top/quilt to the June meeting.

Mystery Quilt Month 9

Cut 2 squares 3-3/8" from Fabric D. Cut in 1/2 diagonally once. Sew these 4 triangles to 4 of the Fabric B triangles from Month 8 along the long side. Press toward Fabric B. These are the corners of the pieced border.

Cut 1 square 3-3/4" from both Fabrics B and D. Layer these two fabrics right sides together and cut diagonally twice like an "X". Sew the pairs together along a short side with Fabric B on top. Press toward Fabric B.

Sew the remaining 4 Fabric B triangles from Month 8 to the long edge of the above fabric B/D triangle units. Press toward the larger Fabric B triangle. These are the center of the pieced border

Sew a center border square in between a right facing and a left facing pieced border strip to make two border strips consisting of 29 pieced squares and 2 border strips consisting of 37 pieced squares. Sew a corner square onto each end of the two shorter strips. You should have two pieced border strips measuring 3" x 78" and 2 measuring 3" x 93".

Sew the longer borders to the sides having Fabric B against the inner border. Press toward the inner border. Sew the shorter borders to the top and bottom, again having Fabric B against the inner border. Your quilt should now measure 78" x 98".

From Fabric A that was previously cut in Month 4 (28" wide strip), cut a piece of fabric 28" x 100". Cut 4 strips 6-1/2" wide x 100" long. Measure your quilt from top to bottom and cut two of the 6-1/2" strips of fabric A to that length and sew to the sides of the quilt. Press toward Fabric A.

Now measure your quilt from side to side. Cut the remaining two strips of Fabric A to that length and sew to the top and bottom of the quilt. Press toward Fabric A. Your quilt should now measure 90" x 110".

Quilt as desired and use the remaining Fabric A for the binding.
